Training PBS Teachers: Part Two

In the Nov/Dec 2023 issue of *News from the Fields*, we shared with you Part One of how we actually teach a Portable Bible School Teacher Training Seminar (PBSTTS). We explained the steps for teaching "Books of the Bible." Now we progress to Part Two—how we teach the lesson on preaching or "Homiletics."

To refresh your memory, PBSes came into being in the 1980s to train up lay pastors for pastorless villages throughout the Democratic Republic of Congo. Today PBSes train lay-pastors for thousands of house churches in urban centers and rural areas in over twenty nations. We have presented the PBSTTS twice in India, four times in China, and once in the Philippines, Peru, Taiwan, DRC, Turkey, Ethiopia and, most recently, Arusha in Tanzania. The next training is set for this April in Eskisehir, Turkey.


So, Homiletics: A 50-minute model homiletics lesson is taught every day in the PBTTS because there is so much to cover, and each lesson is necessary for what follows. We always open in prayer. The first day we answer the question, "What is Preaching?" We go on to explain the text of the sermon, the topic of the sermon, gathering material, and arranging the sermon. This is followed on Day Two with instruction on how to set up an outline with an introduction, a body and a conclusion, and the allimportant invitation. Following these important building blocks, we introduce several types of messages, including biographical, narrative, textual, topical and expository. Recently we've combined the first four to devote extra time to expository. We also teach Inductive Bible Study as a tool for preparing any of these types of sermons.

Homiletics: PBS Model Lesson

To give you a taste of how we teach these types of sermons I will go through the simplest, the biographical sermon, which is a type of narrative sermon. We emphasize that even in the classroom, where we are just "practicing," this is God's Word and it is "*living and active*. Sharper than any doubleedged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow, it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart" (Hebrews 4:12). We also encourage every student sharing the message he has prepared in the classroom to include an invitation to everyone in attendance. A group of trainees work through a lesson together at the PBSTTS held in Tanzania this March.

For this lesson we provide the students with a title, "The Four Surrenders of Abraham," and a text, Genesis 12:1 – Genesis 22. We provide the main points of the body: **A) To leave country and kindred**, Genesis 12:1; **B) Separation from Lot**, Genesis 13:9; **C) Casting out Hagar and Ishmael**, Genesis 21:10; and **D) The offering of Isaac**, Genesis 22. Then we ask the students to note what is missing. As you can see from the chart above, those missing parts are the Theme, the Introduction, any Cross References, the Conclusion, and the Invitation.

Together with the class, we fill in the blanks, listening to their suggestions and guiding them toward something like the following: **Theme** – Total Surrender; **Introduction** – Going into the unknown demands sacrifices; **Cross References** – Luke 14:26 coupled with Genesis 12:1, Luke 5: 27-28 coupled with Genesis 13:9, Luke 22:42 coupled with Genesis 21:10, and John 14:6 coupled with Genesis 22; **Finally, we arrive at a conclusion** such as "Surrender of all we are and all we possess" (Luke 14:33).



The students are reminded of the importance of concluding their sermons with an invitation. We provide an example based on the account of Bartimaeus in Mark 10:46–52. Bartimaeus was a blind man who was called by Jesus to come to Him. As he did so, Mark tells us he threw off his cloak. That cloak might have been worn and dirty, but it was important to Bartimaeus because it kept him warm at night. However, it hindered him from coming to Jesus, so he threw it off.

Is anything hindering you from going to Jesus? Whatever it is, if God is speaking to you, now is the time to throw off all hindrances, come to Him, and surrender totally to the love of God. As the sermon comes to a close, time is given for silent prayer and for listeners to indicate if God has spoken to them.

If the Holy Spirit has spoken to you today through this little window into the PBS curriculum, why don't you come to Him, right now, and totally surrender to Him?



Frank and Jenny are long-time friends of ER who were originally introduced to the ministry through co-founders Willys and Thelma Braun. Frank got more deeply involved with ER in 2020 when we began our Monday-Saturday Zoom prayer meetings. After more than 1,225 days of prayer, Frank still joins almost every time, faithfully praying for the home office and our many international partners—some of whom he and his family had the chance to meet last December.

had the privilege of attending y wife, our younger son, and I a wedding in Bhopal, India in December as representatives of ER. We scheduled our trip from Dec 15 through Jan 3 so we could visit ER friends in Madhupur and Dhanbad as well. We visited schools, villages, churches, and the Sycamore Tree Café, and we saw firsthand some of the amazing work that God is doing in India. We forged deep friendships, gave and received blessings, visited with an official, experienced the adrenalin rush of driving through India's traffic, and marveled at the mighty love of our savior.

Students from ER's Bible schools are planting churches all over India and even in neighboring countries. India's government does not provide an education for all of its children, so graduates from ER's training programs run schools for underprivileged children, teaching them basic life skills. Many students come from Muslim or Hindu families, and though they often are not able to tell you about their family's religion, they all know the good news about Jesus Christ! ER associates have also started schools for very poor women to learn sewing, business, and computer skills that help them earn money for their families.

They also reach out to the least and the lost in practical ways. We broke ground for a village church that meets in the small courtyard of a home. They pray that the building will be completed by Easter, for they have no roof to protect them from the heat of summer or the monsoon rains. This is a problem for other

churches we visited as well. On Christmas Eve we participated in giving sturdy blankets to homeless widows from a nearby Muslim village, and then we worshipped in an open air service on the partially built campus of a Bible school. We warmed ourselves by bonfires as we enjoyed the singing, dancing and celebration of our Lord's birth. (A number of rabbits also joined the service, as well as a dog that chased a chicken through the grounds.)

The wedding in Bhopal opened our eyes to new ways to glorify God and draw families together. The day before the wedding there was a long worship and prayer service for the new family as well as a formal introduction of the extended families on both sides. Marriage unites clans as well as individuals! There was time afterwards for women to get henna decorations on their hands. and the fellowship time lasted until 2:00 am. The wedding itself began at 4:00 p.m. (India time) and lasted four hours, and the reception celebration went late into the night.

We are so thankful for the opportunity that we had to visit India and to spend time with dear friends. The long and exhausting flight was worth it!

A Snapshot into Pakistan

Based out of the UK, David White oversees evangelism and discipleship efforts-including PBSes—that are spearheaded by local believers in Pakistan. The following is a brief report on those ministries.

Children's Ministry

(1) Meet the three-year-old person of peace in her family! She asked her mother to start home church in their home. She and her brother are intercessors, praying for each member of the family as they go out, and praying for safety as they travel on the roads as a family.

(2) When Danish was a toddler, no one could "make him do" other than Sister Salomi. He was the epitome of "bad attitude!" She took him under her wing.

(3) He loves to make Wordless Books (an evangelism method) for his friends. Last year he shared the Good News with his school friends and brought a number of Muslims to repent, believe and receive the LORD. Now nine years old, he is concerned prayerfully for his friend; she did not know the LORD, and he did not want her to go to Hell. He has prayed for her family and shared the Good News with them. He has brought them and another friend's family to repent and believe in the LORD Jesus and started home church in their homes. His ambition in 2024 is to graduate from a Portable Bible School!

Young Evangelists School

(4) Daniyal has been attending and



learning discipleship for four years. He is now 14. Last year he and his six disciples brought 250 of their school fellows in three different schools to faith (100 from a nominal Christian background and 150 from the "majority"). In PBS '23 he was top of the class! In January, he and his 15-year-old sister brought 300 of their new school students to faith.

PBS Graduates

(5) We have seen more than 2,500 lay people trained to become lay pastors. PBS '22 and '23 graduates formed 12 "Triplets" in January and have brought 108 unsaved families to faith in the LORD, prepared them for believers' baptism and started home churches in their homes. They plan to triple to make 36 Triplets and target over 300 homes in March and April.

Kinza, another PBS graduate, got a house cleaning job so she could support her Triplets and pay their fares to make evangelist home visits.



Karishma was a teenager when her pastor father died. She continued to lead the church. She became a PBS '22 graduate and now leads downlines of disciples and Triplets, has used T4T (Training for Trainers), and plans to hold a PBS

PBS '23 graduate Asif lost his job. He had to sell his possessions to make ends meet. But he is committed to fulfilling the Great Commission. The LORD has led him to a totally different occupation. He now stays in a hostel, where there are eleven others in his room. Three are nominal Christian, the rest are from the "majority." He has brought six to faith and holds home church in their room daily.

Adult Literacy Programs

(6) Praise the LORD the Bible Society is providing support and training for teachers for ten centres, all of whom are disciple makers and home church planters.

tione for the Desparate, Helpless & Hopeless

The Abayas live near Jos, Nigeria, where they have directed the International Center of Evangelism since 1999. In addition to leading 26 classes through ER's School of Evangelism, they have ministered through humanitarian aid during times of distress and are increasingly impacting youth through Great Commission Challenge Camps.

A lliance for Africa reported in their research for the 2022 International Youth Day, that Nigeria, the most populous nation in Africa, is home to "the <u>largest</u> <u>population of young people</u> in the world, with a median age of 18.1 years." The article continued:

About 70% of the population are under 30, and 42% are under the age of 15. With the natural increase in the number of young people, there is no corresponding increase in their access to employment opportunities which has dwindled over the years. Rather, statistics show a concerning increase in the rate of unemployment.

This unemployment crisis, when combined with grossly inadequate physical infrastructure, rising inflation, and a repressive political system incapable of ensuring justice and inclusion, portends a bleak future. Many Nigerian youth are seeking any and every means to escape the pains of living in Nigeria. Those who cannot escape the situation are forced into lives of crime, drugs, immorality and sometimes contemplating suicide.

This is, indeed, a bleak picture. However, many others are working hard to make life worth living in the country. Christian youth in particular, in spite of their challenges, seek to make God relevant for their fellow youth. This is the significance of our ministry to young people through the Tentmaker Institute, a new initiative at the International Center of Evangelism in Jos. We are equipping Christian young men and women who have found hope in Jesus to spread that hope to their friends.

The Great Commission Challenge Camps (GC3s) run by the center have been our vehicle for making this happen. We mobilize Christian youth to engage in the Great Commission mandate among their peers. To God's glory, this work is blossoming into a larger mission.

The camps open up opportunities for introducing the unsaved to Christ and restore those who are discouraged in their faith due to the socio-economic conditions. Young believers are equipped with tools to witness and to disciple their friends. We help open up potential opportunities for tentmaking (income earning for self-support). This year we are introducing Inductive Bible Seminars (IBS), training them in effective Bible study skills. Also included are Purity Retreats, where they are challenged in Biblical purity of heart and life. Young people are encouraged to pursue spiritual and sexual purity. These issues regularly come up at the GC3 camps and deserve more focused attention. Our goal is to train young people to live for Christ and share that hope with others.

When these youth leave camp, they become fiery Great Commission Christians with shoes of readiness to declare the gospel of peace. Please pray and, if God moves in your heart, give so that our work of advancing the gospel in Nigeria can progress.
